The exhibition WANG YI DONG'S LATEST WORKS represents Schoeni Art Gallery's most recent effort in bringing to the attention of the Hong Kong audience works of important artists from around the world. Past exhibitions organized by Mr. Manfred Schoeni featuring international artists include Liu Da Hong from China and Russian artist Vladmir Kush. Upcoming shows of two world renowned Russian artists, Alexander Zhacharov and Alexei Sundukov will take place at Schoeni Art Gallery in November 1993.

WANG YI DONG'S LATEST WORKS will open at Schoeni Art Gallery on Saturday, 18 September 1993 and will continue through Friday, 15 October 1993.

Chinese artist, Wang Yi Dong's works are not unfamiliar to Hong Kong art lovers and collectors as his painting *Raining at Mount Meng* fetched a record price at an auction of Chinese oil paintings in 1992. The uniqueness of this unprecedented one-man show in Hong Kong lies in the fact that nine of his finest works will be on view, providing the opportunity for a more in-depth understanding of the artist's latest works. The works on display, all of them in the medium of oil on canvas, are his fruits of labour over the past two years.

Born in 1955, in the mountainous Yimeng region of Shandong Province in The People's Republic of China, Wang Yi Dong began to teach himself to paint as a young boy. At the age of 17, he entered the Shangdong School of Art and was later accepted into the prestigious Chinese Central Academy of Art in Beijing. At the Academy, studying with professors who have sojourned in Europe, Wang Yi Dong was exposed to the influences of Western art, as well as to the classical subjects and techniques of Chinese brushwork. Since his graduation in 1982, Wang Yi Dong has remained at the Academy and is at present an Associate Professor of the Oil Painting Department.

During the past ten years, Wang Yi Dong's fame as one of the leading representatives of Chinese Realism has spread beyond the boundaries of China. His participation in solo and group shows has been widely acclaimed by art critics in numerous countries in Asia, Europe, Canada and U.S.A. In spite of frequent travels abroad, Wang Yi Dong maintains very close ties with his native village in Northern China. The artist's roots are firmly planted in the traditions of Chinese culture and folk art. Farmers and villagers remain a main source of inspiration for his subject matters. The artist not only aspires to a truthful representation of the inner qualities and strength of the rural population through his paintings, but provide ample insight into the everyday life of the inhabitants of China's countryside.

The fine drawing, the distinct lines and the precise composition inspired by Western classical oil paintings further emphasize the complexity of the inner emotive world of Wang Yi Dong's subjects. His paintings confront us with mystery and an inner beauty based on simplicity and truthfulness. Prominent Chinese art critic Wang Hongjian comments, "Wang Yi Dong does not give his subjects anything which does not belong. Their beauty is based on truth, which is more impressive and more touching."

One of the major works of the exhibition Yi River depicts two young village girls beside a river. One of the girls has fallen asleep on the rocky banks and the other is trying to balance herself on a small rock. The unaffected gracefulness of his two subjects contrasts boldly with the austerity of the landscape. The beauty which emanates from this painting can only be the outcome of the artist's sincere and profound observation of his subjects and man's relationship with his surroundings.







Reviving realism in classical oil painting

Wang Yi Dong achieves international acclaim with a tradition that the West has lost



By HILARY BINKS

LOST tradition in the West — realism in classical oil painting — has been brilliantly revived by a young Chinese painter whose works have been widely acclaimed in Asia, Europe and North America.

Hongkong art lovers may remember Wang Yi Dong's painting Raining at Mount Meng, which fetched a record price (\$780,000) at a Christie's auction of Chinese oils in 1992. Now some of his finest canvases, completed during the past two years, can be seen at the Schoeni Art Gallery.

Born in 1955 in the mountainous Yimeng region of Shandong province in northern China, Wang began teaching himself painting as a young boy. In 1972 he entered the Shandong School of Art and in 1978 was accepted into Beijing's prestigious Central Academy of Art.

Wang majored in oils and was assigned to specialist study of Impressionism. But his favourite artists were Italian Renaissance painters as well as Hans Holbein, Rembrandt van Rijn and Jean-François Millet. During his studies he also became well versed in the techniques of traditional Chinese brushwork. After graduating in 1982, Wang stayed on to teach at the academy, where he is now an associate professor in the oil painting department.

However far his travels may take him, Wang's inspiration remains his native province.

He says: "If you say Yimeng is beautiful, it does not seem to be so. If you say the area is a rich one, it is far from being the case. [Yet] when I see Yimeng — its stones, trees, old farmers, children, flocks of sheep . . . or hear its flowing streams, birds singing, cocks crowing, dogs barking or the wind blowing and the rain falling . . I get a sense of intimacy and warmth . . . Things of my childhood become alive again. After a while, animated passion urges me to take up my brush . . ."

Born in the countryside, Wang loves and understands Chinese peasants. As a young man at the Central Academy, his main preoccupation was technique, perfecting his composition and use of colour. For a few years after graduating, his aim

Works from this period show farmers engaged in everyday activities. The influence of Millet is evident in Wang's simple style of composition, and in his depiction of the farmers' inner qualities of honesty and strength, industry and kindliness.

More recently Wang came to feel this genre's limitations, and replications of Yimeng life gave way to distillations of his experience there — often in portraits of people.


"If I paint people against a dark, black rock in ink, I feel it is just like in traditional Chinese painting, very earthy, representing the roots of people's life, their link with nature. I feel this deeper meaning is a higher point of art, more abstract in concept, more universal," he says.

For Wang, the beauty of life lies in nature. He thinks it is no coincidence that the areas with the most beautiful folk art and song — Shandong, Xinjiang and Shaanxi — are all very poor regions, where life is full of bitterness. The people

must create something beautiful to preserve their hope.

"So," says Wang, "when you are in the poorest village and you see a beautiful girl, you do not look at the beauty of the girl, you look at the beauty of life."

Similarly, Wang frequently transposes his eight-year-old daughter, a Beijing city

girl, into her cultural background, in local Chinese dress and against a rustic scene. Knowing her so well, he can make her stand for the whole of rural life in that area.

Inspiration for a painting may come from a fragment of music or the sound of falling rain, of some image glimpsed from

the bus on the way to the country.

Wang's aim in the future is to focus more on the Chinese elements of art. The use of the colour red, signifying harmony, happiness and good fortune, is already seen in *The Bridal Chamber*; the girl dressed in wedding robes sits on a stool covered with traditional flower-patterned Chinese material.

Nowadays, his style is more two-dimensional, his point of view more objective. Wang would like to concentrate less on the narrative, more on the ink and the contrast of black and white.


"Art makes life rich because art creates a new reality," he says. "I hope that using the strong texture of oil painting, I can go back to more traditional Chinese art, which is very profound and which is my culture. I hope that by combining the two — a Western medium with Chinese subjects and characteristics — I can develop a personal language through which to express my understanding of the greater nature. This, I believe, is the way for-

ward for Chinese oil painting."

Wang Yi Dong's Latest Works continues at Schoeni Art Gallery, 5/F On Hing Building, 1 On Hing Terrace, Central until October 15. The paintings cost between \$160,000 and \$650,000. Schoeni will also exhibit Wang's works at Art Asia Hongkong '93, from November 18-22.






