In presenting Europe 1875 - 1975: Selected Works by European Masters, Schoeni Art Gallery Ltd. establishes a new precedent for Hong Kong art galleries: this is the first time a full-scale exhibition of exceptional quality by major European masters is being mounted by a local gallery. In developing the exhibition, the Schoeni Art Gallery Ltd. invited Anthony Brown, of the noted London gallery Connaught Brown, to jointly curate this important show.

Over twenty-seven works, including oil paintings, sculptures, drawings and lithographs by twenty-one European artists of the late 19th and 20th centuries are featured. Included are the wonderful, lush landscapes of **Edmund Wimperis, James Meadowes and Benjamin Leader**, reminders from Victorian England that through the artist's eye the gentle idylls of that era remain with us, fresh and unchanged.

At the same time, in France the Impressionists were forging new paths. In the exceptional works which we have by **Edgar Degas** and **Theophile Steinlen**, we can sense the excitement of the artistic revolution about to take the Continent by storm.

As these innovations took hold, **Henri Matisse**, **Edouard Vuillard**, **Raoul Dufy**, **Charles Camoin**, **Paul Signac**, **Pierre Bonnard** and a host of other important artists emerged to show a vital world of colour which the people of that time had never dreamed of existing. The paintings that then were experienced as visual shock, today amaze us with their power and innovation.

This sense of visual transformation was not limited to France. The Danish artists of the late 19th and early 20th centuries were also discovering a new visual language, but one that was intimate and personal. Today the mysteriously serene, beautifully crafted

In presenting these exceptional works in combination with a select group of artworks by contemporary masters such as David Hockney and Botero, this exhibition offers to Hong Kong art lovers an unusual opportunity to experience, and to marvel at, the richness and vitality of the art created in Europe in those one hundred years.





Europe 1875-1975 Selected Works by European Masters Schoeni Art Gallery, until November 15

OVER 27 works — including oil paintings, sculptures, drawings and lithographs - by 21 European artists are currently being exhibited in a show jointly supervised by Anthony Brown of the noted London gallery, Connaught Brown.

The Schoeni Art Gallery claims to have set a new precedent for Hongkong art galleries with this exhibition: it is the first time a full-scale exhibition of exceptional quality major European masters is being mounted by a local gallery.

What can be said is that the gallery has brought together a stunning line-up of some very great names which travels from France to Denmark, England and Spain. The exhibition also gives viewers an opportunity to see and experience the richness and vitality of the art created in Europe over the space of 100 years.

From Victorian England come the lush landscapes of Edmund Wimperis, James Meadowes and Benjamin Leader; the French Inpressionists, with what was then a fresh, innovative style, are represented by the works of Edgar Degas and Theophile Steinlen. Henri Matisse, Edouard Vuillard, Raoul Dufy, Charles Camoin, Paul Signac and Pierre Bonnard hang side-by-side with Danish artists Valdemar Komerup and Peter Ilsted and contemporary masters David Hockney and Botero.

The exhibition also includes a combination of outstanding modern works by three artists who have become icons of 20th century art - Pablo Picasso, Joan Miró and Henry Moore.

The Fugitive **Director: Andrew Davis Cast: Harrison Ford, Tommy Lee** Jones, Andreas Katsulas

THE film version of The Fugitive has the advantage of a ready made audience, the audience of baby boomers that grew up with the David Janssen TV series of the same name back in the '60s.

loosely based on the TV version (as was necessary given that the original series ran for four years and included all manner of characters and adventures).

And the director and writers have intelligently gone out to make an entertaining '90s film based on the TV series' original premise rather than try to imitate the '60s feel of Janssen's quest for justice.

For those of you young enough to have missed the series, the problem facing hero Dr Richard Kimble (Harrison Ford) is that he has been wrongly accused of killing his wife.

Of course, this kind of thing can backfire as devotees of the original series are likely to react against a cinema update and condemn it as being simply a pale imitation of the original.

This was not the case with this Harrison Ford/Tommy Lee Jones-driven film as the huge (more than US\$100 million) box office returns in the States have proved. It is only very

He knows that the murderer is a one-armed man (Andreas Katsulas), because he struggles with him prior to finding his murdered spouse.

But the police book him for murder one due to circumstantial evidence, and he is subsequently condemned to death. On the way to prison, the other inmates on the bus make a break for freedom, and as a

consequence, Kimble goes on the run.

The other major player in the original series was Gerard, a policeman intent on bringing the fugitive to justice.

In the film, he becomes deputy marshal Gerard (Tommy Lee Jones), an expert at tracking down prisoners on the run and a man who never gives up the chase until his man is in chains or a body bag.

Jones does a fabulous job of portraying the obsessive policeman and all but steals the film from Ford, who as usual puts in a wonderfully understated performance.

But in the end, Jones can't be said to dominate the picture because it is the chemistry between the two characters (as well as some superb editing courtesy of Dennis Virkler who was also responsible for The Hunt for Red October and Gorky Park) which provides the extraordinary dramatic tension in the first half of the film.

For the first 60-minutes of its running time The Fugitive is a breathless, urgent game of cat and mouse with the highly intelligent and highly motivated (he means to find the onearmed man and prove his innocence) Kimble just about staying one step ahead of the equally intelligent and thoroughly ruthless Gerard.

At one stage Kimble gets the better of the deputy and has him at gunpoint. "I didn't kill my wife," says the distraught medic. "I don't care," answers the professional manhunter. It is this idea, that no one cares about anything but his capture, which makes Kimble's flight and struggle for justice feel desperately lonely and therefore all the more poignant.

Unfortunately, towards the middle of the film, the sense that Kimble is alone against the world is lost. This is achieved far too easily and far too early in the film, managing to dissipate most of the tension that had previously been so excellently constructed.

Great story, great acting, great fun. A flawed masterpiece

of the genre.

Art Dealers Promote Western Works

Recent Auction Proves A Flub, but Art Asia Likely to Draw Buyers

Although Rembrandt and Renoir aren't yet household names in Hong Kong, many dealers have decided that they should be.

Hong Kong has long been a center of the international market in Chinese paintings and porcelain. Now art dealers from East and West alike are waking up to the idea that it could become a market for Western art as well, ranging from old masters to emerging artists

This tempting theory was given a boost last week when Wildenstein & Co., a prestigious New York gallery, hosted its first sale in Hong Kong. The sale, held at the Mandarin Oriental Hotel, featured 40 paintings, mostly impressionists, valued at a total of US\$28 million to US\$30 million. Topping the list was a Gauguin forest scene valued at US\$3.4 million.

Although it was billed as the greatest exhibit of European art ever held in Hong Kong, sales were less than stellar.

"I didn't expect people to fight over them," Guy Wildenstein, a dealer at the 118year-old gallery founded by his great-grand-father, said during the show. "I will be happy to sell just one." Following the show, Jacques Durand-Ruel, the gallery's representative in Hong Kong, said that serious negotiations were going on with several Hong Kong Chinese buyers but no sales had yet been made.

Undaunted, Mr. Wildenstein plans to open a gallery in Hong Kong within the next two years.

Although most dealers agree that Hong Kong's market for Western art is in its infancy, the scramble has already begun. Both the French Consulate and Schoeni's Art Gallery featured impressionist and modern works from the West in shows last week. This week, Alisan Fine Arts Ltd., which deals primarily in contemporary Chinese artists, will exhibit abstract works on paper by Willem de Kooning and Jackson Pollock, among others.

On Thursday, 100 galleries will bring US\$400 million in art, most of it by Western painters, to the second annual Art Asia-Hong Kong fair. The fair, housed in the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Center, runs through Nov. 22. Among the guest list are many art world powerhouses: Pace and Andre Emmerich of New York; Marlborough, Waddington, and Richard Green of London; and 24 galleries from Paris. Artists David Hockney, Jim Dine and Frank Stella are to make appearances.

David Lester, the fair's organizer, says it was fully booked six months in advance and turned away as many galleries as it accepted. Last year, the fair ran at 80% of capacity and attracted only a handful of big names.

He estimates that US\$50 million of sales

in Western art resulted from last year's fair.

"That's not a lot by Western standards, but enormous for Hong Kong," he says. This time around, he says, twice as many sales "would not be unexpected."

But for those eager to sell Western art in Asia, warning signs abound. A sale by Christie's auction house in Taipei early last month found buyers for only 23% (by value) of the impressionists and old masters on offer. An art and antiques fair held in Singapore in October rang up US\$40 million of sales, but Western works found few buyers

The big danger is that no one knows what Hong Kong will buy, although everyone has a theory. Modern art matches the fast-paced Hong Kong life style. But works by "emerging" artists are less expensive. Then again, old masters and impressionists could appeal to the conservatism of buyers who are new to the market. The Wildenstein gallery's recent purchase of 49% of Pace Gallery, a leading New York dealer in contemporary art, leads many to believe that its Hong Kong gallery will hang works by living artists alongside

"No one knows what people will respond to," says Stephen McGuinness, managing director of Plum Blossoms, a gallery in Exchange Square. "We're all blind men." Plum Blossoms specializes in traditional and modern Chinese art but is showcasing two American artists at the fair. Mr. McGuinness says that a recent show of Rembrandt etchings at Plum Blossoms brought in HK\$2 million, and that further shows of Western art are in the works.

He also warns that Hong Kong's exorbitant real estate prices could keep many galleries from following in Wildenstein's footsteps. "Can you imagine what it would cost to rent a square foot at the Peninsula Hotel?" he says.

Most agree that a little education in the Western masters is also in order, pointing out that Asia's museums offer little Western art as a reference point. Of Asian countries, only Japan has developed a big appetite for Western art, particularly impressionists. That market boomed in the late 1980s, but in the crash that followed, most Japanese buyers disappeared from the scene. The big names from Europe and the U.S. still command heftier prices than most Asian buyers are accustomed to.

"I tell them, 'The price is 200,000 dollars,' says Mr. Durand-Ruel of the Wildenstein gallery. "And when I add, 'U.S.,' they sigh."

The gallery's next show here will be 17th and 18th century French paintings, which would confront Hong Kong's Chinese buyers with even more obscure names. Says Mr. Wildenstein, "I'm probably the only gallery in the world who owns all its stock. It means I'm not in a hurry.

Others are, and are praying that Hong

Kong's Chinese are as well.

"People who make great fortunes are impatient people," says Mr. Lester, the fair organizer, who likens Hong Kong's wealthy elite to the American industrialists and art collectors of the last century. "They want to begin now, and they want to go quickly.

Seeing the bright side of life in the country

HE latest exhibition at the J R Guettinger Gallery, which runs until November 24, is a kaleidoscope of exotic colour and sinuous line in celebration of the country woman.

Ke Hagen's recent guoache and watercolour work is a portrayal of minority (non-Han) women in China seen working, dancing, even daydreaming in a bright pastel landscape of lush foliage and trees. Their costumes are all highly detailed in a style close to Chinese naive art.

Unlike those who portray minority women as sad and deprived, Ke Hagen does the opposite. He says: "What I experience transcends poverty and deprivation and this is what I am trying to convey in my paintings — brightness, energy, beauty."

Ke Hagen includes his trademark motifs – translucent white horses, slender cranes and stylised clouds – which give his paintings their characteristic linear energy.

His style has evolved out of his study of the Yunnan School of painters who emerged from the Cultural Revolution as a fresh force in Chinese art.

Starting out as a group of Beijing artists sent to Yunnan Province for re-education through labour, these artists derived their style

through the study of folk art, cave paintings and the rural way of life they came across during their forced repatriation.

NEXT month Art Asia will put works by the world's greatest artists on display here and this month Schoeni Art Gallery is offering a foretaste of what is to come.

Its exhibition of modern masters of Europe includes Matisse, Picasso, Vuillard, Hockney and Henry Moore. Europe 1875-1975: Selected Works by Major European Masters, until November 15, sees 30 works on show by those who have become icons of 20th century art.

AT the Galerie La Vong in Lan Kwai Fong there's an exhibition by young Vietnamese painters until early December.

The works by seven young artists provide a mixed view of Vietnam over the last 50 years: deserted coastlines, the lotus and pagodas of Buddhist symbolism or the legacy of a French cultural heritage.

The single female artist, Bui Suoi Hoa, uses a bold, painterly style to convey her childhood in the countryside escaping the urban bombings of the war.

AT the Hanart TZ Gallery until November 20, celebrated Taiwanese sculptor Ju Ming shows his typical exuberance in an exhibition of balletic figures.

Ju Ming uses a sculptural process which involves binding pieces of styrofoam into a shape that hints at a moving figure, and casting it in bronze, to reveal pneumatic, faceless dancers which have both an absurdity and witty lyricism, breaking forth from the foam form that binds them.

THE Urban Council is staging a display of Chinese instruments through the centuries, as part of the current Chinese Music Festival.

The complex history of Chinese music has yielded more instruments than any other culture and organisers cite 134 distinct pieces in this exhibition, from wind and percussion instruments to plucked-string and bowed-string instruments.

The exhibition begins at the Hong Kong Cultural Centre on Thursday and runs until November 25.
